

## GO! Clamshell Cove Pillow

finished size 16" x 16"




### SEWING DIRECTIONS

1. Lay out the 41, 4" finished Clamshells into nine rows of Clamshells offsetting every other row as shown so that one row has five Clamshells and the next row as four Clamshells.



2. **Row #1:** With right sides together sew together two Clamshells for approximately  $\frac{3}{4}$ " as shown.



3. Repeat to create a row of five Clamshells.



4. **Row #2:** Glue baste the first Clamshell for Row #2 using the glue basting method illustrated on following page.

- GO! Clamshell-4" Finished (55435)

### FABRIC REQUIREMENTS

- Fabric 1 (Variety of Prints)—1 Charm Pack (41, 5" x 5" Squares) or 7, 5" x WOF Strips
- Batting—20" x 20"
- Backing— $\frac{1}{2}$  yard


### CUTTING DIRECTIONS

#### Fabric 1:


- Cut 41—4" finished clamshells

#### Backing Fabric:

- Cut 1—16" x 14 $\frac{1}{2}$ " rectangle
- Cut 1—16" x 6" rectangle



5. Start at the bottom of the stem and slowly sew all the way around the half circle.



6. Repeat to complete Row #2.



7. Repeat with Rows #3 through Rows #9.



8. Trim edges to measure 16" x 16".



## QUILTING

1. Layer pillow top with batting and backing.
2. Pin or baste layers together.
3. Machine quilt as desired.


## PILLOW ASSEMBLY

1. Use a 1" seam at the bottom of the 16" x 14½" rectangle.
2. Use a 1" seam at the top of the 16" x 6" rectangle.
3. Sew two snaps 6" from each side.
4. Place smaller rectangle on the bottom with the seam down. Then place the larger rectangle with the seam side down on top of the smaller rectangle overlapping the smaller rectangle by 2½". Using a ¼" seam allowance, sew each side with securing stitches.
5. Place the front and the back with right sides together. Sew all the way around using a ½" seam allowance.
6. Turn right sides out, press.
7. Stuff with pillow form.

## HOW TO GLUE BASTE



1. Place a small drop of glue where your seam starts.
2. Align the corresponding clamshell on top.
3. Using a dry iron, heat until the glue is dry.



4. Repeat all around the curve.



5. This is what it should look like when you get ready to sew.
